Good

- <u>Assembly Bill 80</u> partially conforms state tax law to the federal tax law regarding the **forgivability of PPP loans.** Now law.
- <u>Assembly Bill 150</u> creates an elective tax that passthrough entities can use as a **workaround** of the State and Local Tax (SALT) limitation. Now law.
- <u>Assembly Bill 2164</u> provides small businesses with a **financial pathway** to become more accessible to the handicapped. [Pending approval by the governor.]

Bad

- <u>Assembly Bill 1993</u> would have required all California businesses to demand their employees and independent contractors receive the **COVID-19 vaccine.** Defeated.
- <u>Assembly Bill 654</u> would have **blacklisted businesses** by requiring the state Dept. of Public Health to publish on its website a list of every workplace in the state where a COVID-19 outbreak has occurred. Defeated
- Assembly Bill 1177 called for the creation of a **state-owned bank.** Defeated

Ugly

- <u>Assembly Bill 1400</u> would have seized control of every aspect of **health coverage** even federal programs and put it under the total control of the state at a cost of between \$494 billion to \$552 billion a year. Defeated
- Assembly Bill 2932 would have prohibited an employer from reducing an employee's regular rate of pay as a result of this reduced hourly workweek requirement. Defeated
- <u>Assembly Bill 995</u> would have nearly doubled the requirement to provide **paid sick leave** from three days per year to five days per year.
