October 24, 2022

Voting

All California active registered voters will receive a vote-by-mail ballot for the November 8, General Flection.

October 10, 2022: County elections office mail ballots to all registered voters. Early voting sites, as well as ballot drop-off locations, also open on this date.

November 8, 2022: Election Day. Mailed ballots must be postmarked by this date and received by November 15.

ID Requirements

California does not require photo ID. However, if you are voting for the first time after registering to vote, you may be asked to show a form of identification when you go to the polls.

Polling Place Details

Polling places are open from 7:00 a.m. to 8:00 p.m.
