

GOVERNOR NEWSOM'S NEW WATER PLAN IS A STEP IN THE RIGHT DIRECTION, BUT THE STATE NEEDS MUCH MORE

The State's new plan claims it will produce 6.9 million acre-feet of new water, but California needs 17 million acre-feet to replace the loss of snowpack and runoff to provide a reliable water supply.



THE NEW PLAN IS A DROP IN THE BUCKET AND LEAVES CALIFORNIANS

Some experts predict California could lose 75% of its snowpack in the future. A Lawrence Berkeley National Laboratory report modeled multiple-year sequences of NO snowpack in the Sierra Nevada beginning in the 2050s.

AN ADDITIONAL 10 MAF WILL SIGNIFICANTLY BENEFIT CALIFORNIANS

10 MAF would be enough water for roughly

3 MILLION ACRES

of irrigated farmland to provide vegetables, fruits, and nuts for California residents and the nation.*
